Course Title: English for Medical Conference Presentations



A. An international medical conference presentation: A flashback

It was about ten o'clock. The countdown for my presentation at the international conference of Neurology had just started. I had been cramming for the presentation for the last three days even while I was on the airplane. Last night, at the hotel, my laptop was on as I was double checking my slides. I did what it took to have the best presentation. I even attended some other sessions. However, my presentation was not the one I expected it to be. I wonder what prevented my presentation from being ranked as a top one. Do I need to deepen my content knowledge? Do I need to develop my language proficiency? Is there something wrong with both? How could I build on my linguistic and communicative competence to confidently interact with international English-speaking specialists, scientists, and professors at medical conferences? How could I get the most out of these international medical events? What is your point of view?

B. Introduction: A safe and sound journey to medical conferences

This course aims to prepare the medical scientists and researchers for international conference presentations. More specifically, we attempt to equip the medical specialists with the linguistics (both macro-level generic structures and micro-level lexicogrammatical features) and communicative resources for delivering effective medical talks and establishing their positions as eminent researchers in the international medical circles.

Some presenters keep their audiences suffering from high fever without giving them what they need. Do you know how to make the audiences interested in reading your paper?
7	Handling question and answer sessions	 The question-and-answer session is no longer fatal. Taking these practical language medicines, you can at least survive! Why not trying these persuasive discoursal strategies to save yourself? 	 Do you need to be a medical encyclopedia to answer all questions? Scan these communication strategies. What are the side effects of a weak question-and-answer session? Try these alternatives to avoid them.
